How passion flowers got their name

Why is the passion flower known as the passion flower? This beautiful climbing plant that grows in many of our gardens is not native to the UK, but comes from South America. It was first discovered Spanish missionaries working



there, centuries ago. Drawings were sent back to Europe, and in 1609 an Italian priest interpreted the flower to represent the crucifixion, otherwise known as the Passion

He decided that the five petals and five sepals could represent the ten disciples who remained steadfast (Judas and Peter both abandoned Jesus). The corona could be seen as Jesus' crown of thorns. The stigma could be seen as the cross or nails, and the five stamens could be seen as the number of wounds Jesus received.

'What were you doing on Saturday evening?'

The Blessings and Challenges of being a Street Pastor

Perhaps you were out celebrating a special occasion, enjoying a meal out, at the cinema, supporting a charity event, at the gym, visiting friends/family or just having a cosy night in during the spell of cold weather. Street Pastors are likely to be doing just the same until 9.30pm but then take on a different role until 3.00 am! Perhaps you have met some of the team if you've been out in Stalybridge on a Saturday evening.

As a Street Pastor of almost 6 years, I can honestly say that every 'duty' night is different and it's impossible to predict what kind of night (and early morning)

it's going to turn out to be. Although we know that anything can happen (and does) we still get surprises (both good and bad).

We prepare by praying before we venture out, for example, asking God to protect the team and the people we meet and praying for guidance and wisdom - that we will be led to the places where there is a need and that the Holy Spirit will give us the words/actions needed. Prayer Pastors pray in their homes during the time that we are out – we could

not do what we do without the backup of prayer. If we encounter a difficult situation we can text the Prayer Pastor who will pray for the situation. Sometimes we encounter circumstances or incidents where there is very little we can do practically so we may just stop in the street or pray as we are walking along, bringing the situation/person before God.



There are, however, many situations where we can 'make a difference' there and then e.g. by giving out flip flops, water, sweets, space blankets, hand-

warmers etc; by giving directions; by sweeping up glass; by helping someone to a taxi; by calling CCTV or an ambulance; by being a calming influence in a potentially aggressive situation; by buying chips or a hot drink for someone; by listening; by giving just word of а encouragement/support – these situations we show God's love, show that we care and most of all don't judge.

We can learn a lot ourselves from people we meet and often feel very

blessed and humbled. We receive lots of positive feedback from people just walking past who shout 'thank you for what you do and for being there.' Some stop to tell us of times when they or their friends have been helped by a Street Pastor. Some tell us that Street Pastors saved their lives; some that they 'turned a corner' or felt that there was some hope when they were in despair. Many ask why we do it – of course that can be different for each member of the team.

For me personally, I feel that it is important as a Christian not just to talk about Jesus' love and the sacrifice he made for each and every one of us, but also to show and reflect that love where possible. Being a Street Pastor gives me the opportunity to thank God for what he has done for me and also gives me the privilege to show God's love to others in a practical way.

It can of course also be challenging, particularly when it's cold and wet or we're feeling tired or 'under the weather' but once we are out God gives us the strength to continue and there is almost always something that happens that makes us feel very blessed. It's a very humbling experience.

Your prayers for the team and for new recruits would be appreciated.

St James' pupils help Tameside to celebrate International Women's Day

The event to mark International Women's Day, is a global day that celebrates the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women and calls for action to accelerate gender parity. It brought people together at Ashton Market Place, from 11am to 12.30pm, on Thursday 8th March as the nation honoured 100 years of women's suffrage – when some women gained the right to vote.



The event took place near the steps where some of the most famous suffragettes gave speeches, including Ashton's Hannah Mitchell who was a key worker for women's rights.

Tameside Council Leader Cllr Brenda Warrington, Tameside Civic Mayor Cllr Joyce Bowerman and Ashton MP Angela Rayner all gave speeches.

Entertainment included a song and dance by young women from Tameside College, 2 songs by a group of our pupils and a performance from soloist Sarah Kinsey.

Participants were wearing purple sashes and badges and Tameside Youth Council gave pebbles painted in suffragette colours to people to write messages on.

There were excerpts read from "The Hard Way Up - the Autobiography of Hannah Mitchell, Suffragette and Rebel" and the speeches Emmeline Pankhurst made from the town hall steps. The Representation of the People Act 1918 gave women the vote provided they were over 30 and owned property or were married to a property-owner.

There were stalls selling ribbons and wristbands, and the Mayor of Tameside and other inspirational people were giving speeches to the crowds. /contd......

A group of pupils from St James' Primary School sang two songs on the stage. One of the songs was from a play we previously performed in school, and was about women fighting for the right to vote. The audience laughed and cheered at the part in the song when the girls were demanding the vote and the boys were telling them NO!

The audience loved our performance and were clapping and cheering. We all really enjoyed the performance and felt very proud listening to all the great feedback from the audience. Mrs Marsh, Miss Allan and Mrs Walton were overwhelmed by the great feedback from everyone watching and felt very proud of us.

After the singing, three of our school council (Sienna, Harvey and Olivia) interviewed some of the dignitaries and organisers of the event. They wanted to find information about the event, and the reasons behind the celebration of the role of women in Tameside.

The Mayor said, "100 years ago women got the right to vote and everyone should be treated equally. Today is about spreading the word of women and young



people". When asked what needs to be done in Tameside to support women she responded, "There should be more campaign work, women should receive the same pay as men for the same jobs and the men should support the women more".

Others said:

"It's a special day celebrating the achievements of women and particularly about them getting the vote."

"We want to empower and support all women."

It was a great day with a very important message where women were sharing their voices to make equality heard!

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The Royal British Legion launches THE SILENT SOLDIER

The Royal British Legion has announced the launch of its SILENT SOLDIER campaign. The Silent Soldier is the near life-size silhouette of a First World War 'Tommy' which can be fixed to a wall or attached to an upright pole in public or private spaces.

It is anticipated that the Silent Soldier will be displayed across the UK by businesses, Churches and local authorities as a reminder of the sacrifices made by men and women of the armed forces during the First World War.

Churches are being invited to endorse the Silent Soldier concept and to sponsor and display one or more silhouettes throughout the period from September 2017 to late 2018 when the nation will be commemorating the Armistice and the end of hostilities.

The Silent Soldier silhouettes have at their base the words "1914-1918 Lest We Forget".

Silent Soldier silhouettes are cut from black cut dibond and are tough and weatherproof: they are supplied with bolts and with angle iron posts for free-standing display.

Would you be hungry if you had walked 250 miles?

How far do you walk each day? 15 minutes to and from work or the bus stop? As a parent how far do you ask your child to walk?

For families now fleeing South Sudan for Uganda, the distance is very different: they have a 250-mile trip on foot, taking with them only what they can carry. That is like walking from London to the Isle of Man. And when they arrive, they are given only a bag of rice, some very basic supplies to make a shelter, and a plot of land which they are to farm. Provisions are given out only monthly. How long would you last in that situation?

This is why Feed the Hungry are running a desperately needed feeding programme in Uganda, and the good news is that it takes only £24 to provide meals for six children for a month.

Feed the Hungry is a well-respected and established charity which has already delivered more than £200 millions of relief supplies to people in over 92 nations worldwide. They work closely with government agencies and local pastors and churches to ensure that the food reaches those who need it most. Currently, more than 150,000 children are being fed by the charity's 'Every Child, Every Day' programme. If you would like to help, please


